

Rehoming former racehorses



Many horse owners around Manilla will treat their fourlegged friends to an extra dipper of chaff for the August 1 official birthday this Sunday.

But up Deepwater way at Ballyoch Horses, dozens of gallopers either too slow or who have reached their used-by date on the racetrack will enjoy many more birthday celebrations thanks to Patrick and Winsome Herde's Thoroughbred Rehoming Program.

Working in conjunction with Australian Of The Year's 2020 Local Hero Bernie Shakeshaft and his popular BackTrack program at Armidale, the couple employ troubled youth on a rotational basis on their property just out of Deepwater. The youngsters - ranging in age from 12 to 20 years have helped with not only the reeducation of horses for the polo fields, showjumping circuit or one day eventing, but also for cattle work, fencing or even construction of new equine facilities on the property, according to Patrick.

"I love working with them. Just about everything here on the place

lot of pride to see what they can actually do," Patrick said.

Many of the youngsters have

Many of the youngsters have varied talents in certain areas, so at Ballyoch, they're given the chance to enhance onthose skills.

"They may have different skills, so we get them to help with things like cattle, dozer or machinery work, fencing and helping with the horses. The last team we had put in a new watering system for the horses and cattle. It started with the kids coming two days a week and we'd teach them what we could, but it wasn't really rewarding for them. That's changed though, now it's five days, and they love it – keep coming back. We tell them the harder they work, the better they get paid, and they really light up."

Also an asset to Ballyoch Horses in the rehoming program is Finnish equestrienne Nora Eranpalo.

"She's taken the retired racehorses to a completely new level by working on them and taking them around to showjumping events," Patrick said. Patrick Herde, who freely admits to an insatiable passion for working with horses, was born and reared in Goondiwindi, then fulfilled a childhood dream by heading north to the Kimberley after leaving school. There he worked in stock camps and breaking in horses for two years.

"The company I worked for wanted a fulltime contract breaker, so for the next six years, I did that along with ducking home to Gundy (Goondiwindi) to help with the family property. Then I met and married Winsome, and because we both preferred the cooler weather at Deepwater, decided to settlethere and build up our breaking in business."

But building the business was tough according to Patrick.

"One month we'd have 30 horses, so would employ help and buy hay, then the next month we'd get two horses. It got frustrating. Then I listened to a podcast about the rehoming of racehorses, the idea being that it would not only create job opportunities for regional Australia, but also give the horses a good life after they'd finished racing. I put a proposal together for Racing NSW, knowing I'd have to present myself well, and they liked it. We work with probably around 10 retired racehorses on a rotational basis from Team Thoroughbred NSW, as well as continuing our own breaking-in business."

Patrick and his wife though have a big goal – "we'd love to get into a thoroughbred breaking in and pretraining business, though we'd probably need a couple of trainers to back us. Then we could employ more of the kids," he said.





Rates notices on their way to mailboxes

A total of 28,676 Tamworth more than last year. Residents of Regional Council rates notices -48 more than last year - will start to be delivered to local mailboxes this week.

The average increase for residential ratepayers in 2021-2022 is between \$48 and \$98 - between \$1.20 and \$1.88 a week.

Council's total income from rates and charges for 2021-2022 is \$78.257 million and is part of a budget with a total spend of \$251 million.

"It is our biggest ever budget with a total spend of \$251 million due largely to the \$106.4 million capital works program to improve local facilities and infrastructure," said Tamworth Region Mayor Col Murray. "We are particularly pleased to have a small cash surplus of almost \$150,000 - the decisions made by the Council in recent years to build our financial resilience has allowed us to navigate the challenging economic impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic better than many other councils."

The rates rise for 2021-2022 was applied after Council adopted the 2 per cent rate cap increase to the General Rate income as set by the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) for all NSW councils.

Council will increase water, sewerage and trade waste service by 2.0 per cent and waste management charges by 10.0 per cent. Consumption charges for water use will also increase by 2.0 per cent. Residential and business ratepayers will pay \$18 more for sewer availability, \$6 more for water availability for the year and up to \$32 more for waste collection for the year.

The average Tamworth residential ratepayer will receive a total annual rates bill (including water, sewer and waste services) of \$2,825. This is about \$98 more than last year's total rates bill for the average Tamworth residential ratepayer. In Barraba, the average residential ratepayer will receive a total annual rates bill of \$2,108, which is about \$72 more than last year. The annual total rates bill for a Manilla resident will be an average of \$2,100, which is about \$69

Kootingal and Moonbi will, on average, receive a total annual rates bill of \$2,016, which is about \$68 more than last year. The total annual rates bill for the average Village residential ratepayer will be \$2,077 which is about \$70 more than last year's total rates bill.

Tamworth residential ratepayers will provide a total of \$22.575 million in General Rate income with Barraba accounting for a total of \$377,989, Manilla \$582,196, Kootingal \$437,764 and the other villages in the region \$233,751. Business rates will return \$6.596 million in income from 1,723 businesses and 3,014 rural properties will return farmland rates of \$6.168

Anvone who needs help to understand their rates notice can call Council on 1300 733625.

Rates can be paid in full or by instalment. The first rate instalment is due for payment on August 31, 2021.

A range of payment options are explained on the back of rates notices. Payments can be made by direct debit, using BPay, by phone or in person at any of Council's Customer Service Centres at Barraba, Manilla, Nundle and Tamworth or at Australia Post.

Any ratepayer having difficulty paying should call Council on 1300 733 625 and ask to discuss entering a special arrangement to pay their rates. Council has a Ratepayers Hardship Policy which can be accessed confidentially by anyone experiencing financial

The New England is to benefit from new and improved mobile coverage thanks to Round 5A of the Australian Government's highly successful Mobile Black Spot Program.

Deputy Prime Minister and Member for New England, Barnaby Joyce welcomed the news that six mobile black spots in New England are set to be addressed under this round of the Program.

"Macrocells will be constructed at Glen Elgin, Mole River Exchange, Tenterfield, Watsons Creek and Woods Reef Exchange with a further Small Cell at Bukkulla, north of Inverell," Mr Joyce said.


"These new installations are in addition to 45 new and upgraded towers which have already been installed in New England, following strong lobbying on your behalf and I will continue to work hard for improved services across the New England.

"The six new sites are set to provide improved mobile coverage for the local community, allowing visitors and locals alike to stay connected, access education services, conduct business and remain in contact with family and friends," Mr Joyce said.

"I look forward to working with Telstra so that building the new infrastructure can get underway and the community can benefit from improved coverage."

Minister for Regionalisation, Regional Communications and Regional Education, Senator Bridget McKenzie, announced the Government has committed \$20.5 million to fund 67 new mobile base stations across Australia.

"This announcement brings the total number of base stations being funded under our Mobile Black Spot Program to over 1,270, representing a total investment of over \$875 million," Senator McKenzie said.

"These base stations will improve coverage in disaster prone areas, along major transport corridors and trial new approaches to delivering coverage.

"The 67 base stations funded under Round 5A across regional and remote Australia will collectively deliver over 12,000 square kilometres of new and improved handheld coverage. The Government is committed to continuing to work with industry, and state and local governments to improve mobile coverage and connectivity across Australia."

Senator McKenzie said a key priority of Round 5A is to test new approaches to supporting improved mobile coverage.

"The Liberals and Nationals Government encourage mobile network operators to deploy shared mobile infrastructure to reduce cost and provide new coverage from more than one carrier," Senator McKenzie said.

'Round 5A includes funding for a trial solution of seven base stations from Thargomindah to Waihora in Queensland, including at East Thargo, Dynevor Downs, Bulloo, Paroo and Eulo that will allow all mobile network operators to provide services."

"Access to 21st century communications is an essential service for all Australians no matter where they live", Senator McKenzie said.

The full list of base stations funded under Round 5A of the MBSP is available on the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications website.

"Mrs Worley (Principal) received an email inviting the school to participate, so we put the idea to our P & C meeting who were all in favour of holding one. There are probably very few within the school who haven't been affected by Cancer in some way or another. It was so successful, and sure to be an annual event for us now," Jess said.

Like all other schools across the state, Term 3 for Attunga Public School students commenced with Level 2 Covid restrictions. This means that students will be attending face to face learning with non-essential visitors restricted from school sites, and certain activities modified to be Covid-safe. Masks are recommended indoors for all staff if they choose to wear them. Masks though are mandatory on public transport for students aged 13 and over. Some work visitors will be allowed into the school grounds, but must adhere to the Department's Covid guidelines.

Principal Mrs Worley stressed that parents are urged to keep up to date with Covid guidelines using the NSW Covid website. Some of the main pointers include:

Maintaining physical distancing by avoiding gatherings outside the school gates. Remain outside gates unless exceptional circumstances apply (vulnerable or disabled students). Mask wearing and signing in using Service NSW QR code when entering school office. Some school-based activities like assemblies may be held, but visitors will not be permitted. Masks to be worn at any P & C meetings.

Covid has also taken its toll on the school's Term Three calendar. Postponements include school photo sessions on July 15, NAIDOC Day celebrations at Somerton School on July 16, and the Great Aussie Bush Camp excursion from July 26 to 28 while the SUPA Club and Playgroup have been postponed until further notice.

Drawing on the ideas, experience and knowledge of workers is an important way to identify all hazards and choose effective control of them. Changes of equipment should be discussed with them first. Workers should be encouraged to report any hazards or health and safety problems immediately so they can be managed before an incident occurs.
- Improve Production Informing workers when work practices are updated can lead to a smoother production process and potentially boost product quality.
- Share The Load Talking is the healthiest way to get through hard times. Don't let negative thoughts build up in your mind. Stressing about drought or pressures to get production completed on time is one example. Talk to neighboursand share thoughts with family and workers. Perhaps even see a GP or other support group.

Recipe of the week

Chicken with tomato, capers and olives

This recipe is simple and flavoursome and everything but the chook can come straight out of the pantry.

This dish is sometimes called Chicken Marengo and is named for the place in Italy where Napoleon won a battle in 1800. From Napoleonic battles to kitchens in Barraba. Life is strange. This quantity feeds eight.

2 tablespoons olive oil 16 chicken thighs with skin on, back bone removed 2 garlic cloves, crushed 3 cups chicken stock 3 400g cans peeled tomatoes 200g kalamata olives 1 jar capers, drained

Heat most of the oil in a large saucepan. Add the capers and cook for a couple of minutes until starting to crisp up. Remove and set aside. Add the remaining oil and after it is hot add as many of the thighs as can fit with the skins down. Cook until golden on each side. Repeat in batches. Return all the chicken to the pan with the garlic and half the stock. Bring to the boil for a couple of minutes. Add the rest of the stock, tomatoes, olives and capers and simmer uncovered for 30 minutes. If you think the sauce isn't thick enough you can remove the chook and simmer the sauce down until it thickens up. Return the chicken to the hot sauce for five minutes to heat through.

Stir through lots of chopped parsley before serving. This dish can be served with potatoes or rice and some green vegetables. Very good the next
